**1 July 2017**

**Golden Years (2016)** John Miller. 1hr 36 Min. English. Comedy/Crime. Starring Bernard Hill, Ina Stubbs, Virginia Mc Kenna, Alun Armstrong and Simon Callow.

Fate, the pensions crisis and the injustices of old age result in a group of law-abiding pensioners stumbling into a life of crime. A light-hearted and entertaining comedy which makes robbing banks look easy and the authorities numbingly incompetent. Many of the favourite faces of British Film and TV star in this banks, bowls and bingo romp. Not quite a Carry On remake but close.

**5 August 2017**

**Lion (2016)** Garth Davis. PG-13. 1hr 58 Min. American/English. Biography/Drama. Starring Dev Patel, Nicole Kidman and Rooney Mara.

A five year old Indian boy gets lost on the streets of Kolkota. Thousands of miles from home, he survives many challenges before being adopted by an Australian couple. Twenty-five years later his epic search to find his Indian family and home manages to make Google Earth dramatic while packing tear-jerking power. An Oscar standard film which combines clarity of vision and tremendous ingenuity to make classic cinema.

**2 September 2017.**

**Toast (2010).** SJ Clarkson. 1 Hr 36 Min. English. Biography/Comedy/Drama. Starring Oscar Kennedy, Victoria Hamilton and Colin Procktor.

The ultimate nostalgic trip through everything edible in 1960's Britain. The film ia a warm-hearted biography of Nigel Slater, the well known food writer and chef. He loves his mother who is a hopeless cook, her finest offering being the eponymous toast but he has a distant relationship with his father. His mother sadly dies young but his new stepmother is a superb cook. As the only boy in his school cookery class, he competes with her to find a way to his father's heart. Starting work while at school with a weekend job in a pub, he gains the inspiration and confidence to leave home and head for the hotel kitchens of swinging London.

**7 October 2017**

**Hidden Figures (2016).** Theodore Malfi. PG. 2Hr 7Min. American. Biography/Drama/History. Starring Taraji Hanson. Octavia Spenser and Janelle Monae

The story of a team of three female African/American mathematicians who played a vital role in NASA during the early years of the US space programme. The film follows them working furiously on the calculations for the launch and re-entry of John Glenn's 1962 mission as the first American to orbit the Earth. By this time, the Russians had launched the first satellite and put the first person into an Earth orbit. The US was desperate to claw back this advantage and win the space race and by extension the Cold War.

**4 November 2017**

**Viceroy's House (2017).** Gurinder Chadha. 12A. 1Hr 46Min. English. Drama/History. Starring Gillian Anderson and Hugh Bonneville..

A personal drama about the traumas of the partition of India set in the Imperial residence of Lord and Lady Mountbatten. The film describes the epochal events of 1947 for the widest audience including those who know nothing of Indian independence and the creation of Pakistan with interesting insights into the great political figures of the age. It presents a refugee crisis driven by political duplicity illustrated with the intertwining of contemporary Movietone footage with arresting modern cinematography.

**2 December 2017**

**Eagle Huntress (2016).** Otto Bell. G. 1Hr 27Min. Documentary/Adventure. Starring Aisholpan Nurgaiv, Daisy Ridley and Rys Nurgaiv

A spell binding documentary follows a 13 year old Mongolian girl fighting to become the first female eagle hunter in twelve generations of her Kazakh family. Through breathtaking cinematography and intimate verite footage, the film captures her personal journey while also addressing universal themes of female empowerment, the natural world, coming of age and the onset of modernity.
